# Referral Pathway for all agencies who may encounter a potential victim of adult trafficking/slavery

## Examples of indicators that may suggest a person is a victim of trafficking/slavery:

Be aware that not all indicators may apply. Modern Slavery can affect all ages & genders.

# **GENERAL INDICATORS**

1. 2. 3. 4. 5.	Evidence of control over movement, either as an individual or as a group Found in or connected to a type of location likely to be used for exploitation Restriction of movement and confinement to the workplace or to a limited area Doesn't know home or work address Threats against the individual or their family members				
INDICATORS OF FORCED LABOUR*					
1.	Dependence on employer for a number of services for example work, transport and accommodation				
2.	Any evidence workers are required to pay for tools, food or accommodation via deductions from their pay				
3.	Imposed place of accommodation				

\*Please note these indicators may also apply to people who are self-employed, or are working through an employment agency. Use common sense to assess whether you believe a person to be in need of safeguarding.

## INDICATORS OF DOMESTIC SERVITUDE

	No proper sleeping place or sleeping in shared space e.g. the living room No private space			
3.	Forced to work in excess of normal working hours or being 'on-call' 24 hours per day			
4.	Never leaving the house without employer			
INDICATORS OF SEXUAL EXPLOITATION				

1.	Movement of people between brothels or working in alternate locations	
2.	Person forced, intimidated or coerced into providing services of a sexual nature	

- 2. Person forced, intimidated or coerced into providing services of a sexual nature
- Person subjected to crimes such as abduction, assault or rape 3.
- Someone other than the potential victim receives the money from clients 4.

#### Examples of questions that may be helpful having a conversation with a potential victim of trafficking:

- Would you know where your identity documents are kept and do you have free access to • them?
- Is the work you're doing in this country the type of work you expected to be doing before you • arrived here?
- Before you arrived here what were you told you'd be doing?
- If you wanted to could you leave when you choose to? If you left with me today would there be any consequences?
- Are you worried that someone may hurt you or your family if you don't do what they want?

Note: The above are not exhaustive lists and are there for guidance, don't ignore the obvious, e.g. someone tells you that they have been exploited. If in any doubt - continue with your referral.
