





NRM STATISTICS AND HELPLINE DATA

NRM referrals in the South West have significantly increased since Q1 2017, in line with national trends.

The high number of male minors entered onto the NRM has resulted in criminal exploitation being the largest reported typology of MSHT.

NRM REFORM

The Home Office are introducing a series of reforms to the NRM process, including –


- Places of Safety
- Single Home Office competent authority
- Multi-agency negative Conclusive Grounds review panel
- Digitisation of NRM referral forms
- Longer move-on periods post NRM support
- Six-month drop-in services through Local Authorities
- Reduced subsistence allowance

MODERN SLAVERY APP

On Monday 30th July Unseen launched an app that provides an alternative channel of communication for those who want to reach the Modern Slavery Helpline.

The app includes information about the different types of modern slavery, the signs to spot, and what to do. Users will be encouraged to call the Helpline or complete the online reporting form provided through the app if they need help or want to report something concerning. It can be downloaded here.



The Clewer Initiative have launched the Safe Car Wash app, which encourages users to assess businesses against a set of indicators and can be found here. This information is passed to the Modern Slavery Helpline and NCA.

SELECT COMMITTEE INQUIRY INTO HAND CAR WASHES

An Environmental Audit Committee into Hand Car washes is conducting an investigation into the impact of these sites (details here). Avon & Somerset Car wash regulation working group has submitted evidence recording the progress and findings of the work they are doing with businesses in Bristol.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

The Neighbourhood Watch have created a comprehensive Modern Slavery Toolkit, which includes leaflets, presentations, information resources, and action plans. The toolkit has been circulated to their members

to run awareness raising campaign, however they have indicated they are happy for anyone to utilise the resources in it.

BEDFORDSHIRE ASP

CHILDREN'S SERVICES SOUTH WEST

UPDATES FROM LOCAL PARTNERSHIPS

Avon & Somerset – The Car Wash regulation project continues, with secondary visits planned for September, and the Rural Exploitation working group is developing a POA. ASC will be conducting a follow up survey in September to test staff understanding of MSHT. A scrutiny panel is also being organised to assess the quality of investigations, with Unseen and CPS providing external

Dorset – Community Safety Partnerships are planning an event in November focused on the criminal exploitation of children and adults.

Gloucestershire – Gloucestershire County Council is developing a Modern Slavery infographic as part of a drive to improve communications on Modern Slavery. They are also developing a focus on rural exploitation, which is under reported in the area.

Devon and Cornwall – Jez Capey will be taking over from Ben Deer as chair of Devon and cornwall ASP.

Swindon and Wiltshire – Jem Carter has taken over from Craig Holden as chair of the SWASP. The partnership has developed a toolkit detailing the various powers agencies have to combat MSHT.



Key changes to current process & support offer as a result of NRM reform:

- (1) 'places of safety' for those rescued out of exploitation by law enforcement bodies ahead of making a decision about whether to enter the NRM
- (2) New Home Office Unit as Competent Authority instead of split of cases between UKVI and NCA
- (3) Quicker CG decision making and the introduction of (4) independent multi-agency panel reviewing all negative decisions with ability to recommend reconsiderations
- (5) Minimum standards of care introduced during the R&R period
- (6) <u>Increased periods of move-on support</u> and a (7)<u>structured transition</u> out of care through pathway planning with local authorities involved as appropriate, with 6 months of drop in support available to those staying in the England or Wales
- Whole process supported by new digital system (including digital referrals and a digital case-working function); a review of the role of first responders and the training they need; and minimum entitlements for potential victims set out in regulation.
